It's about inclusiveness, respect and a sense of belonging for everyone. On Thursday students will be participating in Harmony Day activities as part of our student Showcase afternoon.



It would be AWESOME, if we could all work together and achieve 80% for the end of the year.

Attendance – Every Day Counts & School Starts at 8.30am

1. Parent Responsibility – to make sure their child is attending school EVERY DAY!

2. Parent Responsibility – to explain their child's absence and if late to school.

3. School Responsibility – to make contact with families if their child is absent and it has not been explained.

4. School Responsibility – to meet with families if students are having continued absence or a high amount of absence (even if explained).

Please contact school using details below – if your child is not at school.

If a student is going to be absent from school parents/caregivers should:

- Ring the school on 4789 6333 to report the absence and reason why the student will not be attending that day
- Provide a note explaining the absence prior to or on the first day of the student returning to school
- **ABSENT HOTLINE 0426305975** that you can ring or text to leave a message.

Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education. Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind.



Smart card and bus pass update:

Kinetic has extended the amnesty period to cover the whole of term 1. Due to numerous setbacks, cards are unavailable to be mailed out to families at this time. The hope is that they will be received by families by the start of term 2.

Students can continue to use the bus as normal, without a pass or smart card and without payment during this time.

Some information on the smart cards:

Students who are eligible for a government funded bus pass (STAS PASS) will automatically be issued a smart card along with their STAS pass. Parents/Carers of these students will NOT need to fill out a smart card request form.

Students who are not eligible for the STAS pass will still need a smart card as the school buses are beginning the transition to cashless travel. Parents/Carers of these students WILL need to fill out a smart card request form. This form can be obtained by emailing the schools admin on:

Please note: Student smart cards will be accepted on urban buses. However, EFTPOS payment of fares will not be accepted on school buses.

Travel regulation information:

Students who have not received their pass or smart card WILL **NOT** BE REFUSED TRAVEL.

Drivers are required to request payment as this is part of their job, but students without money or a pass will still be allowed to ride the bus without it.

High school students in older grades without a pass or money can be requested to show a student ID card by the driver, as proof that they are a student. This is mostly relevant to school students using urban bus routes. Student ID cards are issued by the school the student attends.

Please note: Abuse of drivers by students will NOT be tolerated by Kinetic and can result in the student being suspended from using Kinetic services. This course of action is enforceable under the Queensland Government Code of Conduct for passengers using bus services.

Jewellery

Supporter bands and wristbands are not permissible accessories for school.

Our Student Code of Conduct policy (Responsible Behaviour Plan) reflects the importance the school places on students displaying courtesy, consideration and respect for others whenever they

are using personal technology devices.

Our strong preference is that Students do not bring valuable personal technology devices like mobile phones, iPads, smartwatches to school as there is a risk of damage or theft.

Permission may be given for a student to have a mobile phone at school for safety reasons. Each morning the device will be handed to office staff, where it will be turned off and remain for the school day. On your child's departure at the end of the school day, they can collect from the office. Breaches of inappropriate use may result in disciplinary action.

Being Cyber Safe Mobile Phones/ Ipads/ Electronic Devices

In today's society our children have a wide access to electronic devices and social media apps. Safety online and when using the internet is of high priority in today's society.

Cybersafety refers to online behaviour that is safe, appropriate and responsible.

Information for students

Everything that you share, like, comment and post online contributes to your digital identity. Your audience can be bigger than you realise. When you are online never give away your home address, phone number, email address and passwords or any other personal information. If you don't know and trust someone in the real world, delete or block them online. Don't be fooled by fake profiles or mutual friend suggestions.

Make positive choices. Stay in control of your online world. If you make poor choices while on social media or online games there may be social or legal consequences. When you are online never give away your home address, phone number, email address and passwords. You should treat strangers the same way online as you would in the real world.

Social Media apps such as Facebook, Tik Tok, Snap Chat, Instagram <u>have a minimum age of</u> <u>13years and older</u>. This means our students should not be using these apps at their age.

Please be aware if your child is using these apps – they have a minimum age of 13+ years



If families are giving their child permission, then we ask that you speak with your child in regards to the safe use of these apps when online and appropriate conduct when online, and are aware of the processes to block or report.

We ask that parents are aware of the expectations when using Social Media apps. We also ask that you speak with your child and if they are involved ensure this does not further occur.

Even though your child might not be part of this they may have overheard conversations and we ask that you please have a conversation with your child to reinforce that appropriate conduct when using social media.

Information goes home regularly in our school newsletter around Social media and steps families can take if there is a concern.

What you can do:

- Tell a trusted adult and ask them to help you
- Block the user. Change the settings on your device so you don't see any further messages. [The eSafety Guide as information on how to do this] <u>https://www.esafety.gov.au/key-topics/cyberbullying</u>
- Report it social media apps and sites have 'reporting' links to send them your concerns.
